LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We live in an age of mass communication. From emails and text messages to social media and video conferencing, it has never been easier to communicate with others. Yet while our ability to communicate has increased, the substance of our communications has deteriorated. More and more, our public discourse takes the form of echo chambers that amplify rather than challenge preconceived ideas.

At the Center for the Study of Liberty, we believe that vigorous exchange in the marketplace of ideas is critical to the building and maintenance of a free society. Furthermore, we believe that the responsibility for this kind of exchange belongs to all of us, not just pundits. For this reason, we invite women and men who

have a diverse range of professional backgrounds, personal experiences, and ideological perspectives to join us in conversation. At our events, we ask people to talk with one another about the meaning of individual liberty and its relationship to human flourishing. We hope that our events start meaningful discussions that continue well beyond our formal programs.

While the Center was founded in 2015, 2017 was a breakout year for our work. As the following pages will show, we grew in every recognizable measure. We hosted more events, partnered with more organizations, and engaged more people in conversation, all coordinated by a growing number of staff members and an increased base of support.

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ABOUT THE CENTER

A Case for Conversation

At the Center for the Study of Liberty, we recognize that a peaceful and prosperous society requires not just the free exchange of goods and services, but the free exchange of ideas as well. Yet our public discourse is too often characterized by increasing hostility toward (and a lack of empathy for) those with whom we disagree. The intense anger that pollutes many of today's conversations leads us to view those with opposing opinions as "the other," or even, as "un-American."

Through in-person and online conversations led by experienced facilitators, the Center brings people with diverse ideological viewpoints together to read about, respectfully discuss, and think through issues critical to the meaning of liberty and our shared quest for human flourishing. Our events invite participants from all walks of life to listen to and to challenge one another in productive ways. We make conversations possible that offer those involved a richer understanding of important issues that affect their communities. As they leave Center events, participants are equipped with the knowledge and encouragement needed to continue the conversation with family, friends, and others.

2017 IN-PERSON EVENTS

Center events engage participants in exploration of principles and ideas that support human flourishing.

In 2017, we partnered with several organizations to host ten events across the country. These events encouraged sustained conversation between thought leaders, entrepreneurs, and other community members on topics including: education reform, poverty, entrepreneurship, and regulation. While partner organizations convene the audience, our staff designs the curriculum, identifies faculty and policy experts, and provides educational resources that allow participants to continue the conversation after the event.

In November, we co-hosted an event in Jackson, Mississippi with the local chapter of America's Future Foundation on the topic of mass incarceration. As the state with the fifth highest imprisonment rate in the United States and a thirty-eight percent recidivism rate, this subject is an important one for the local population.

Dr. Chris Surprenant, Associate
Professor of Philosophy at the
University of New Orleans and editor
of Rethinking Punishment in the Era of
Mass Incarceration, led a discussion
on the facts about and policies
relevant to criminal justice reform
and mass incarceration. Participants
left the event with the tools to engage
others in conversation about this
complex, politically charged subject,
connecting big ideas about freedom to
their local context.

Online Programs

Like its in-person events, the Center's online programs directly engage participants in face-to-face conversations about human freedom and flourishing.

In 2017, we ran two successful online discussion experiments that brought people from around the country together to exchange ideas in an intimate environment. By leveraging video conference technology and expert facilitators, we provided participants with unique opportunities to dig underneath the surface of controversial topics like healthcare regulation and police militarization to work together to find common ground and develop more nuanced opinions.

By carrying civil conversations to an online platform, the Center helps individuals go beyond the common echo chambers of the internet and rediscover the art of civil conversation—the ability to listen, think about, and respond to the person with whom we are speaking.



In 2018, we'll once again partner with America's Future Foundation to host an event on civil discourse; we'll co-host a Socratic seminar on entrepreneurship with the Adam Smith Society at the Manhattan Institute; and we'll experiment with an extended series on free speech with alumni of Rhodes College. As a result of a grant from Atlas Network, we'll conduct multiple events on poverty alleviation. We'll also launch a monthly newsletter at the end of the first quarter, and we will increase the number of online discussion groups we hold.
